December 3: Bob Weir – "Peace through Forgiveness"

Bob will present the concepts of Radical Forgiveness as put forth by Colin Tipping, founder of The Institute for Radical Forgiveness Therapy, and Compassionate Latitude, a forgiveness process created by the HeartMath Institute.

December 10: Crystal Fach - "The Transgender Issue in Schools"

Crystal identifies as a "Queer/Non-Binary person". They have been in leadership roles within multiple gender and sexual diverse organizations across Ontario. Crystal has a history of community and political advocacy for 15+ years and has worked as an educator and front-line worker within diverse sectors.

December 17: Ed Brost – "We are Witnessing an Emerging Global Hydrogen Economy. <u>What is the Impact on Water Supply? Is there an</u> Offsetting Water Opportunity?"

Conventional technologies require almost 10 tonnes of water to make one tonne of hydrogen. Not much is being said about that implication. But is there an upside to this implication? We will talk about water scarcity, virtual water, and a potential partially offsetting opportunity connecting hydrogen use and water supply.



Everything Possible: UU Children's Book Updated



For forty years, the song "Everything Possible" has encouraged children and adults to live and love freely: You can be anybody you want to be / you can love whoever you will / you can travel any country where your heart leads / and know I will love you still. Now, the song is getting a new life: in the form of a picture book and updated lyrics that further embrace inclusivity.

Written in 1983 by Rev. Fred Small, who was a professional folk singer and songwriter before becoming a Unitarian Universalist minister, "Everything Possible" is a favorite among UUs, LGBTQIA+ choirs, folk singers, children, families, and others. It is hymn 1019 them after consulting with trans and nonbinary in the hymn book supplement Singing the Journey and has been regularly performed by the Boston Gay Men's Chorus and many other groups.

"It's really been the greatest honor of my musical career that a song that I wrote has been so embraced by the LGBTQ community," says Small, minister for climate justice at Arlington Street Church in Boston. Small wrote the song at the request of a lesbian friend whose young son was struggling to be gentle and kind when the world often insisted boys be tough and strong.

How the children's book Everything Possible came to be

In late May 2023, Everything Possible, by Small and Northern Ireland-based illustrator Alison Brown, was published as a children's picture book by Nosy Crow, an independent publisher based in London. Its June release coincided with the song's fortieth anniversary

and with Pride Month.

Brown contacted Small three years ago to suggest they put his beloved song into picture-book format. A QR code inside the book takes readers to free audiobook versions of Everything Possible, both sung and spoken by Small.

For the book, Small made two changes to the song lyrics. To minimize gender-binary language, he changed, Some women love women, some men love men / Some raise children, some never do, to Some women love women, some men love men / Some leave every label behind.

The other change was to remove gender-specific language in the song's lines, There are girls who grow up strong and bold / There are boys quiet and kind. In the book, he writes, Some children grow up strong and bold, while some are quiet and kind.

Small, who is a straight, cisgender man, had been contemplating the changes for some time, and made friends and colleagues. His hope for the book, he says, is "the same hope I have for all the songs I ever wrote: That they give people solace and a sense of solidarity, a sense of power, and a sense of possibility."

A Letter from Vyda by Vyda Ng, Executive Director

Greetings,

I recently returned from Prague, where I was fortunate to attend "Leading into the Future," a gathering of more than 50 Unitarian Universalists (UUs) from a dozen countries. Revs. Diane Rollert (Montreal) and Ndagijimana Fulgence (Ottawa) and I were there to represent Canada in a global conversation on theology and lay leadership.

From North and South America, Asia and Africa, we came together in Prague to imagine what a new global UU and Free Christian organization might look like. What is needed internationally to sustain and grow our faith, and how can we collectively answer those needs?

Similar conversations are also taking place closer to home. The Canadian Unitarian Council is initiating a strategic planning process called <u>Living into the Future: Emergent Sustainability</u>. In the coming months, we will be inviting you to share your thoughts, desires, and questions about the future of the Canadian Unitarian Council and Unitarian Universalism in Canada. How can we remain relevant and sustainable?
