



Making Meaning In Liminal Times

Your Program Team has 'opted in' to a new initiative being offered by the Saskatoon Unitarians, "Making Meaning in Liminal Times".



<u>The goal is to explore six urgent questions for our time in collaboration with six UU ministers</u>, Debra Faulk, Brian Kiely, Meg Roberts, Arran Morton, Samaya Oakley and Karen Fraser Gitlitz.

On the first Sunday of the months of October, November, January, February, March and April, there will be a live service which will be recorded in both full-service and sermon-only versions.

On the second Sunday of these months, we will use the sermon-only recording for the presentation portion of our service.

Then, on the third **Saturday** of these months, there will be a two hour "deeper dive" adult religious education conversation for those who want to explore the topic in more depth. These sessions will be facilitated and hosted by that month's speaker. Members and Friends will need to sign up individually for this on-line adult R.E. program on a sliding scale of \$35-\$140. More information to follow.

It is hoped that our Fellowship will be enriched by engaging the questions and ideas presented as well as by connecting and having ongoing conversations with other UUs from across Canada.

Valour Remembered

Over the last 3 years, Tom St. Amand and Tom Slater have been researching and interviewing family members, in order to write stories about local soldiers and their sacrifices in times of war. The project is an entirely non-profit, volunteer endeavour.

The book VALOUR REMEMBERED is a collection of 25 stories about soldiers from Sarnia-Lambton, many whose lives and heroism have never been told. All were young men; some were brothers; a few were married with little ones at home; and many made the ultimate sacrifice and never saw their loved ones again. What united them was their unwavering courage as they risked their lives for others' freedom.

Spanning events from The Great War and World War II to the Korean War and The War in Afghanistan, *Valour Remembered* includes the following stories:

- A sailor who faced a four-day blizzard in a lifeboat
- A navy stoker who commandeered a U-boat
- An airman and his crew whose plane disappeared for over two years
- An infantryman who was captured by the SS two days after D-Day
- A sailor whose ship encountered the first stealth U-boat of WWII
- A soldier whose final act saved another's life during the Blitz
- A WWII veteran who promised to look after "his boys" in Korea

The official launch of VALOUR REMEMBERED is set for Saturday, September 23rd from 1:30 until 2:30 at the Royal Canadian Legion on Front Street. At that time, copies of VALOUR REMEMBERED will be available for \$20 per book.

Rev. Rodrigo Emilio Solano-Quesnel (Rev. Rod)

(Feb. 27, 1981—July 11, 2023)



Reverend Rodrigo ("Rod") Emilio Solano-Quesnel died suddenly at age 42 in a traffic accident early on the morning of Tuesday, July 11, 2023. His life partner Sarah Wert was with him at the time of the accident and suffered non-life-threatening injuries.

Rod was born in Mexico City on February 27, 1981 to Leticia Rosana Quesnel and Luis Pastor Solano Flores. In 1991, he moved to Canada, settling into a new life in London, Ontario with his father and step-mother Martha Patricia Rosas Arellano and later, Patty's niece Navil Astrid. While attending Carleton University he was introduced to Unitarian Universalism, a religion that resonated strongly with him. He became an active member of First Unitarian Congregation of Ottawa and began feeling called to Unitarian Universalist ministry.

After attending seminary at the Montreal School of Theology (affiliated with McGill University), Rev. Solano-Quesnel served as Intern Minister at First Unitarian Congregation of Toronto. It was also in Toronto that Rod met his sweetheart Sarah Wert. Following his internship, Rod and Sarah joined Neighbourhood Unitarian Universalist Congregation (NUUC), also in Toronto, which ordained him in 2016.

Rev. Rod then served as the half-time Developmental Minister at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Ottawa for two years, alternating weeks between both Toronto and Ottawa, and calling both places home. Rod moved to Leamington in Essex County in 2018, where he served as the settled minister of the Unitarian Universalist (UU) Church of Olinda from August 2018 to July 2023.

Rod was a boundlessly loving human being who nurtured positive change in the lives, communities, and world which he was - and is - part of. He listened thoughtfully to all who sought his ear, was intensely intentional in his actions, and exuded both childlike joy and understanding beyond his years. Rod was very human and far from perfect, but he was divine in his embodiment of love, grace, and connection. Rod was relentlessly himself and passionately committed to others. He will be profoundly, profoundly missed. Rod is survived by his partner Sarah Wert, his mother Leticia, his father Pastor and step-mother Patricia, and many other loving relatives.

Further words from the Canadian Unitarian Council: "Our hearts are heavy as we mourn the tragic death of Rev. Rodrigo ("Rod") Emilio Solano-Quesnel ... His impact extended far beyond his congregations. He was actively engaged in the national UU community, serving as a Director on the Canadian Unitarian Council's Board of Trustees for the last several years, and had just stepped into the role of Secretary. He brought levity, insight, level-headed wisdom, and compassion to his work on the Board. He had been a member of the Pastoral Care team for young adults, was a facilitator for the CUC's Men's Inclusivity Action Group, and had facilitated several dismantling racism and inclusivity forums. Rev. Solano-Quesnel was instrumental in crafting the CUC's 8th Principle. His loss strikes at our hearts and he will be deeply missed."

Norma West Linder (Sept. 4, 1928 – Aug. 26, 2023)

Norma left us last week after a short stay at Bluewater Health.

Norma was unable to attend our Sunday services in recent years but prior to that she came regularly with her partner James Deahl and dear friends Peggy Fletcher and John Drage. All four them were well-known and beloved writers and poets and now only James lives on.

Norma spent her childhood on Manitoulin Island and her teenage years in Muskoka. While still a high school student she met John Henry Linder, a drummer in a jazz band who was 10 years older than Norma. She said that they would "turn heads" when they walked down the street together, but she was attracted to this handsome man who was "larger than life", funny and like Norma, loved jazz.

They married, eventually settling in Sarnia, and had 3 children, Straja Laureen, Karen and Jay. Sadly, John Henry died in his sixties when Norma was in her fifties.

James said, "Norma was loved by all who knew her and disliked by none. She will be mourned by many". Her literacy legacy includes 8 novels, 16 collections of poetry (her last one "Cabbages and Kings" was published in 2020 and includes a poem about our UU Flower Communion), a children's book, a memoir of Manitoulin Island, a collection of short fiction and a biography of Pauline McGibbon. She taught English and Creative Writing at Lambton College for 24 years and for many years wrote a monthly column for the Sarnia Observer.

We will miss her gentle presence as we cherish her memory.

A private family memorial service and interment of ashes will take place after Labour Day. Details of a celebration of Norma's life will be forthcoming.

Unitarian Universalist Association—New President

The UUA Welcomes the Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt as the Tenth UUA President



It is with great enthusiasm that the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) welcomes the Rev. Dr. Sofía Betancourt as the tenth UUA President. We also note that this is Rev. Dr. Betancourt's second "first day" as a president of the UUA. She was appointed co-president for an interim period in 2017 and provided guidance and care during a significant moment in our history. This time, she will be in the presidential role for a six-year term and we are eagerly anticipating her leadership, working together to continue to advance Unitarian Universalism and live our values deeply in the coming years.

Her presidency comes with a number of historic firsts – she is the first openly queer person and first woman of color to be elected UUA president. She has served Unitarian Universalism for more than twenty years as a religious educator, minister, scholar, and member of the UUA national staff and many volunteer committees at the regional and denominational levels. She most recently served as Resident Scholar and Special Advisor on Justice and Equity at the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee.

Rev. Dr. Betancourt holds a Ph.D. in Religious Ethics and African American Studies from Yale University as well as an M.Div. from Starr King School for the Ministry, where she also served on the faculty. She is the author of *Ecowomanism at the Panamá Canal: Black Women, Labor, and Environmental Ethics* (2022). You can learn more about her in a new **Q & A with** *UU World magazine,* including how early life experiences shaped her path to ministry.

As significantly, she also brings to the role theological depth, a commitment to communal care, and a pledge to continue to organize for justice. She has also expressed an appreciation for the diverse voices and leaders in our community as well as for the hard work that UUA staff does every day. We know that Unitarian Universalists (UUs) across the country and UUA staff will all benefit from her experience, wisdom, and sense of care.

Carey McDonald, our Executive Vice President, expressed his keen anticipation in this way, "we are excited to have the Rev. Dr. Sofía Betancourt at the helm as UUA President to lead us in the next chapter of our faith's journey. We are already inspired by her deep theology and commitments to community care and imagining the way forward together." (UUA Press Release—July 10, 2023)
