During the dark winter chill of February, I hope you are able to disconnect from the daily hustle and bustle and find some quiet time to reconnect with your spirit of life.



Are you grounded?

It's a question that can land very differently, depending on one's age. To a child or teen, it's most likely a question about punishment—about whether someone is being disciplined for having broken some rule.

But to an adult (and arguably for younger people, too), the question "Are you grounded?" can mean so much more: Are your feet firmly planted? Are you connected to what most deeply sustains you? Are you staying close to home, to the heart of things? Are you in touch with the spirit of life, which lives and moves and has its being in you?

The process of grounding—of becoming grounded—is a spiritual practice itself; and there are countless ways to go about it. For some, it's a state of being reached through regular meditation or prayer. For others, it's in more physically active pursuits, from running to yoga to hiking in the great outdoors. For others, it's in tending relationships, in nurturing the ties that bind us together.

At the dawn of a new year, may you give thought and intention to becoming more grounded. Because, in my experience, people who are grounded have a better sense of who they are and what they are capable of. They are more resilient, better equipped to meet life as it comes. That is my new year's wish for you all.

With Humour, the Unitarian Universalist Hysterical Society Talks Seriously

Let's talk about sex, ba-by...

One February break long ago, I found myself at the airport on the way to a UU conference. I'd just finished small talk (Where are you off to? Religious conference. And... Zero follow up questions).

Behind me, a young woman who was part of a whole gang headed somewhere warm for spring break said, "Oh sxxt, we need to get condoms!" to her friend. A little louder than she'd intended. She looked at me in horror and began apologizing.

"I don't see what you have to be sorry about," I answered, channeling UU Ministers and Religious Educators from across the nation, "By every measure of morality I can think of, making sure everyone has condoms is an act of responsibility and kindness." Her whole face transformed, and she grinned from ear to ear. "You're right!" she said, looking empowered.

Since 1971 UUs have supported positive sexuality education. Our current program is named OWL (which stands for Our Whole Lives Sexuality Education). It is a force for good in the world, for people of all ages.

Well, not everybody. Because we have this terrible habit of using acronyms without explaining them, the OWL program has led to many disappointed birdwatchers reading pamphlets titled things like "Everything you want to know about our OWL program". These pamphlets contain a great deal more than some of these birdwatchers wanted to know about sex (and gender, and consent, and healthy relationships, and...), and a great deal less than they wanted to know about owls.



That said...I *love* that UUism supports love and sexuality, in whatever constellations of people and gender and practices that all parties are enthusiastically consenting to.

Maury Prevost, lead for the Host Team, sends you all a warm invitation: "On behalf of the Host Team, the hosting First Unitarian Congregation of Ottawa, and our collaborators at the UU Fellowship of Ottawa, I invite you to come to Ottawa in person to join us for the events over the May long weekend of 2023. Although we can't promise that the tulips will be at their best for the long weekend, spring will be well underway, and the Tulip Festival should run May 12-22 in 2023. With spring flowers, national museums, many parks, and other activities in Canada's capital city, it is a good time of year to visit Ottawa, so you may wish to extend your stay before or after the Canadian Unitarian Council (CUC) events.

Canadian Unitarians for Social Justice

Breaking News:

Canadian Unitarians for Social Justice to Continue Advocacy!



There was debate in 2022 whether CUSJ should fold after many years of involving UU's in social justice causes but the consensus was to continue meeting, discussing issues and speaking out.

So, it was good to connect by Zoom with over 20 UU's from different parts of Canada on January 28th for the first monthly meeting of 2023.

It was interesting, for example, to hear how UU congregations in Toronto were collaborating on affordable housing, homelessness and sponsoring an Afghan refugee family to come to Canada. They refer to their joint efforts as being part of a "Unitarian Commons".

There was a presentation by Tamara Lorincz, a senior researcher at Canadian Voice of Women for Peace, who spoke about her attendance at the COP 27 international Climate Change Conference in Egypt and her subsequent visits to Russia and several Eastern European countries including the impacts of the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. A lively discussion on these topics followed. She was very critical of the \$19 billion purchase of F35 fighter jets by Canada.

Finally there was an appeal for Canadians to support Hassan Diab in his appeal to the Canadian government to stop his extradition to France in April to stand trial for a terrorist bombing he was not involved in. Hassan was cleared of any wrong doing by French investigators after spending several years in a French prison but prosecutors appealed that decision.
