Description: In what ways is artificial intelligence pushing us to deepen our ethical and theological muscles? The advent of AI chatbots has opened a whole new area of ethics as we figure out when and whether it is ok to use artificial intelligence. Speaker bio: Karen Fraser Gitlitz is Saskatoon Unitarians' parish minister and a professional Art Therapist. For the past three summers, she has been a participant and a core walker with the Water Walk for the North and South Saskatchewan River, following Indigenous leadership by walking the river in Ceremony for the healing of the water. In all of these activities – ministry, art therapy, and water walking – she is drawn to the healing that comes when we are able to connect to ourselves, our communities, and the land.





As a chemist working in the valley, I understood it was my job to always “get it”. Knowing that the quality control numbers were factual, knowing that the recipe of the day wouldn't lump a reactor, were the day-to-day realities of my job for many years.

Our Fellowship has presented me with the opportunity for a different perspective. It is a community in which we can acknowledge that we don't always “get it”. Many of us put a tentative toe in the UFSPH water bowl because we didn't accept the rote answers given by main stream religion and we were searching to explore the impossible to understand or interpret (aka inscrutable) paradoxes of the real world.

It brings me joy to be part of the UFSPH community of Members and Friends that celebrates the mystery and miracle of life.


